

# The InnerNet

#### **JUNE 2019**



Wow! The time I spent in Greece and Turkey on pilgrimage was fantastic. I learned so much; and am renewed and eager to teach, preach, and help you gain a new perspective and appreciation for St. Paul, Christianity's earliest days, and how they impact our lives today. One of the main questions our pilgrimage group began to study concerned the Emperor, power, status in the Roman era.

Power, supremacy, authority, titles. "Divine, Son of God, God, and God from God; Lord, Redeemer, Liberator, and Saviour of the World." Don't these all sound familiar to us today? We often use them in worship and prayer as titles referring to God, and God's son, Jesus Christ. Yet these titles were first used to denote Caesar the Augustus—Emperor of the Roman Empire! Imagine how a

tiny band of followers, who were not powerful people in government or religion began using these titles to refer to a man put to death on a Roman torture device (the cross). Imagine how scared they may have been, or how empowered by God to proclaim the message of hope and salvation in God who is, who was, and who promises to always be. Imagine how the leaders and powerful ones reacted!

The Empire into which Paul went was one in which the Emperor's power and status was engraved on coins, on buildings, carved into statues, worshipped in temples, where sacrifice offerings were regularly made. In my travels through Greece and Turkey, I saw the remains of those temples, statues, and offering places. I saw how the Emperor, as well as the powerful and wealthy who had status, controlled every aspect of life. Religion and Emperor-worship were inescapable. Life was regulated for women, children, slaves, and craftsmen, those the Empire conquered, and those born into it. Everyone had a place, a role, a function.

Christ-followers interrupted that system. Paul was a true radical, utterly transformed through the encounter with the Resurrected Christ. Paul the true radical, believed in a new order, a new life, the power of God. If you think about it, from fledgling beginnings, to the millions of followers today, the power of God is undeniable. Yet into this 21<sup>st</sup> century we know that Christ-followers are fewer in America than ever before, so we must wonder together what does this mean for us at Living Saviour, for God's Church, for the future of Christ-followers.

Paul and the other apostles offered a vastly different way of life, one that contrasted significantly to the Roman culture. Women and children were valued as persons of worth; slaves and slave owners were considered equal in the eyes of God; no one held more status than anyone else, no matter their employment, position or wealth. These values attracted the "God-fearers" those who were interested in Judaism but were not Jews, and the religious pagans, "seekers" we might call them today. From these humble origins, Christianity was born.

An article I read recently by Mark Tidsworth, author of the SHIFT materials wondered about how churches have gotten away from being Christ-followers living the way of Jesus, to be more concerned about growth in numbers. While numbers of members are important simply from the standpoint of paying bills, as a pastor, I am more concerned about the individual spiritual growth of those who are part of this congregation—member or not. As a Christ-follower, I want to live, model, and teach these ways of living Jesus showed us, Paul preached, and the earliest disciples exhibited. Those ways are what grew the earliest church numbers because they were so different! The earliest followers faced significant persecution, death threats, ostracizing from families, friends, and business. To choose to follow Jesus meant a new way of life. Life today for those who do not know Christ and who become Christ followers is much like the earliest days, it means exchanging old life habits for new ones; and perhaps even being ostracized by friends or family.

As we move into the summer and begin planning for our upcoming educational year, we will be listening to feedback from the Shift small group meetings and prayerfully discerning what God is up to in our community and in this congregation. What can we learn about what it means today to choose to follow, what habits do we need to take on, what habits do we need to let go, what spiritual practices can we become more skilled?

I am excited to consider anew what it means to be Jesus' follower. You are invited to come along on the journey and grow in faith and maturity. Together let us see where God is leading.

#### **RESULTS FOR 1ST QUARTER OF FISCAL YEAR ENDING JANUARY, 2020**

Below is a brief report for the Fiscal Year ending January 31, 2020; as of the end of April (which is our third month of the fiscal year). We had a net income of \$28,499, which is the result of being over on contributions and under on expenses, relative to the budget forecast.

I have taken a 'relook' at my contribution forecast to see why we are doing better than predicted. Our pledge income has come in earlier than I expected. It is great to have the pledge income come in early! That doesn't necessarily mean, however, that we will have a positive variance on our pledge income by the end of the year.

Furthermore, we are doing much better on non-pledge income than I predicted. Non-pledge income is from people who didn't turn in a pledge as well as visitors and new members. Both are doing better than I expected. Although I do my best to give an accurate forecast of contribution income without being conservative or aggressive in my estimates, predictions are more accurate when more statements of intent are turned in.

In addition to the good results for contribution income for this quarter, we are under on expenses. Some of the expense variance, \$1,384, is associated with utilities, which is a good thing!

I do believe that we are going to do better than we budgeted and at this stage, think we can break even by the end of the year.

As the year progresses, I will continue to look at our performance compared to budget.

This report shows a decrease in the amount of income to the Forward from Forty fund of about \$5,000 from what was reported last month. This is due to an accounting correction: a change in a contribution received in March from the Forward from Forty fund to the General Fund (net of contributions received for the Forward from Forty fund).

Contributions to Forward from Forty include a contribution of \$20,000 from Preschool.

Expenses were for the Canopy Education building, Drain installation, Fire Panel replacement and telephone system replacement.

When Do We Meet: 2nd and 4th Tuesdays each month. In June - Tuesday, June 11 and Tuesday, June 25


