Late November in North Carolina can be absolutely splendid, with leaves changing color, temperatures moderating, and the life of the church turning from the end of stewardship to the beginning of Advent. A perfect time of year to fly away and take a cruise out of Miami, relishing the sunshine and warm temperatures, knowing that December is just around the corner, with shorter days and longer colder nights. Brian and I got away on just such a cruise and it was pure bliss, relaxing without cell phones and internet for a few days to recharge and rejuvenate.

One of the most fascinating aspects of cruising is the wide range of languages, cultures, and nationalities of the other passengers and the staff. We took a bus with a couple from Australia, shared a meal with a family from Puerto Rico, and listened to Japanese families play mini-golf. Our cabin steward was from South America, our wait staff from Malaysia, China, and Japan, one of our bar tenders from Central America, reflecting so many places from around the world. We truthfully live in a global economy.



One of the most vital aspects of preparing to sail away, at least according to the cruise line and the Coast Guard rules, is the “muster drill.” A muster drill means you go to your assigned station, have your name checked off a list, and attentively pay attention to the safety instructions in case the ship should do something foolish, like run aground, sink, or in some way require you to abandon ship. This is imperative and everyone must participate. Brian and I gathered with about 150 others, people who spoke a wide variety of languages, and had differing skills in English, the main language spoken on the ship. The Muster Drill “Sargeant” if you will, was Italian, spoke Spanish and English quite well, and worked hard to help us quiet down, pay attention, and understand what we were to do in case of an emergency. He asked everyone to put away cell phones, cease conversation with others, look at him and the other crew demonstrating the life jackets and how we would enter the life boats. He tried to make it lighthearted, fun, and interesting because what he had to communicate was life-giving, vital, and critical information. It would help us in case our lives were threatened. Yet he had a challenge on his hands. Language barriers, fractious children, cruisers who had already enjoyed one too many fruity concoctions, and the distraction of a cell phone game, movie, or twitter feed worked against his intent of passengers paying full attention to what should have been a thoughtful time of learning about how to save our lives, and what the cruise line was doing to ensure our safety in the event of an emergency.

As your pastor, I was reminded how the Church seeks to communicate the vital, life-giving nature of the gospel of Jesus to a world that is uninterested or doesn’t understand, and would rather do anything else than listen. The gospel is God’s good news to this world, yet language barriers exist. We who are in the church speak a different language than those outside our walls. We sing songs that do not resonate pointing to scripture, events, and stories which are unfamiliar. We speak a language of liturgy which seems difficult to follow, and assume a depth of biblical understanding that many do not possess. Yet what we speak of in church is vital, life-giving, and critically important. We are tasked with being the Muster Drill “Sargeant” if you will, tasked with getting the attention of those around us, trying to convey this vital gospel, and being assured we have done all we can to offer God’s lifesaving gospel to others.

I believe the church is struggling with this task. With all the shifts in the world around us, we have a much more difficult time being obedient to God's call to share the gospel. We have not necessarily given each other the skills and support needed to share the gospel, and have often done a poor job of holding each other accountable for learning and sharing the gospel.



As we move forward from our fortieth year into God's unfolding future, how will you share the life-saving, vital, critical information of Jesus with those around you? What direction can and should Living Saviour go as we seek to follow God, and live into being what and who God has created us to be? God is holding up the life jackets for us, pointing the way to the life boats. We are the ship's crew who will guide our passengers to safety. In the year 2020, let's work together to learn and help others learn about Jesus, the life-giving gospel of God whose birth we celebrate at Christmas.

Children, who in the past would most likely have tried to go to sleep with the pangs of hunger gnawing at their stomachs. Even though these other children live in a country blessed with so much not all share in those riches. A child sits in his winter coat on the floor of the kitchen struggling to sound out the words of the reading textbook, the book resting on the open door of the oven- -the only source of light in this chilly apartment. He waits patiently in the locked apartment for one of his parents to return from one of their part-time minimum wage jobs. He is thankful that the family is no longer forced to go from one shelter to another night after night or sleep in an alley beside a vacant building. He is able to attend Smithfield Elementary School now and receives breakfast and lunch at the school during school days. He was worried that during the Thanksgiving break he wouldn't have access to the meals, since school won't be in session. His mother reminded him yesterday that she had to be home this Saturday morning to welcome a smiling volunteer from Living Saviour Church who was bringing bags of food for them as their family was part of the Smithfield Backpack Program. His mother and he had eaten and slept at the Living Saviour Church Shelter during the previous Summer and all the different people there had been so kind to them that week. Thinking of those smiling, caring volunteers from Living Saviour always bring a smile to his face.

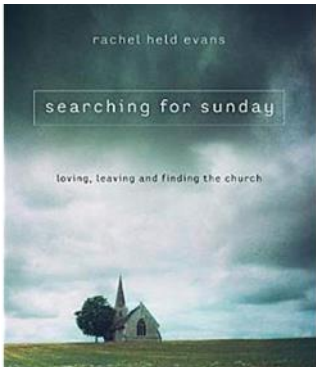
