Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Hebrews 11.1

Or as the Message Bible puts it... The fundamental fact of existence is that this trust in God, this faith, is the firm foundation under everything that makes life worth living. It's our handle on what we can't see.

When life is hard and scary has anyone ever said, "Have a little faith," as an encouragement that came off more as warning, or put down for feeling scared? Maybe someone has used those words to try to gain your trust, or accept their ideas that seem less than ideal and leave you feeling uneasy. This kind of faith is not a faith in God, rather a faith in fate, life, another person, or even a put down for being uncertain or having fear. Having faith in God who we cannot see or feel in the way we feel another, seems at time difficult if not impossible. Not surprisingly, we are not the first to experience this.

The letter to the Hebrews was written to 2nd generation believers, a congregation in crisis for their beliefs--facing persecution, even death; fearful and unsure that God in Jesus is with them; trust in God-stagnant, with no daring confidence that the Spirit would show up, use them to grow God's kingdom. They might still show up for worship but their vibrant hope and expectation that God was with them, dim. The writer sought to encourage, warn, instruct, and remind them of God's faithful ones who came before them, that God is with them even as they cannot see God, and that the hope for their future is secure in God's hands.

Perhaps our congregation today needs reminding of the same things. When we see changes that overwhelm our trust in God, divisions over vaccinations, politics, masks, and our fear of the future rises up, remember, faith cannot be separated from hope. Faith, hope, God's love, triumph over fear.

As my friend and colleague Pastor Alice said recently, "the church today needs reminding of the extraordinary truth—our faith in God is alive, energy, breath-giving, framed and fueled by HOPE, and together helps us get through days that are hard, times that are hurtful, weeks that are wearying." Our faith is not ever separated from our hope, because both of them are God's gifts to us through the power of the Holy Spirit, poured out on us in our baptism. We are God's children, and God will never leave or forsake us. We hope for a future we cannot see, we have faith God will see us through. Yes things are different, yes we are facing challenges as we adjust to our new normal in COVID days.

Yet we remember faith is God's assurance that God's promises are sure, trustworthy, true. God is about life, wholeness, love, forgiveness, God invites us to be partners, co-creators of opportunities for health, wholeness, healing, and the sharing of God's love with those in our families and communities. Replace "I worry" with "I wonder." Then be curious, wonder with me, what is God up to next here in South Charlotte? And watch with me for God's faithful showing up.

LSLC Council Message

A new roof and a new mortgage...that was the result of the Called Congregational Meeting on September 26th.

It was great to see so many familiar faces at the meeting on Sunday, both in person and online. Here's a recap of what happened.

A motion was made and approved to accept the estimate of \$50,000 from H&S Roofing to replace the Fellowship Hall and Office area roof and skylights. The funding for this effort will come from the Forward from Forty reserve fund, which has a current balance of \$64,282. H&S can get shingles that match the Sanctuary roof, which is very good news! The expected time for completion of the project is 30-60 days. Thanks to Janet Axtman, property person on the Council, and to all who have contributed so generously to the Forward from Forty reserve fund over the years.

A second motion was made and approved to accept the mortgage refinancing agreement with BB&T/Trust. The amount of this mortgage request is \$565,000 plus an additional \$50,000 for a total of \$615,000. This is a 10-year mortgage at a fixed interest rate of 2.5%, with a monthly payment of \$5,798 (which is a \$613 savings per month). Since our current mortgage is with BB&T, we avoid any closing costs. The extra \$50,000 will be placed in a restrictive reserve account that will be used at the discretion of Council and the congregation. Thanks to Tim Goldbach, Treasurer, and the entire Financial Team for their efforts on refinancing.

Prayers for renewal and for our congregation, preschool, and staff are vital.

At its September 19th meeting, Church Council approved the signing of a Faith Community Health Ministry Services Agreement between Atrium Health and Living Saviour Lutheran Church to provide Living Saviour with support and assistance for attaining "physical, emotional and spiritual aspects of healthcare." This support will include but not be limited to providing program structure, educational and spiritual development resources and mentoring to the Faith Community through the efforts of a Health Ministry Team.

This is exciting news! Currently the Health Ministry Team is composed of Laura Michael, RN, Barbara Avard, Linda Frixen, Kristen Alford, Greg Mitchell, and Judy Hughes. The work of the Team will be to Educate, Advocate, Refer, and Screen to minimize Health Risk Factors and Maximize Optimal Health Assets.

Anyone interested in joining the Team is super welcome. **Our Mission Statement: To partner with our Creator to restore and maintain Health and Wholeness to all of Creation.**

In response to the depressing realities that the United States spends more money on health care than any other developed country in the world resulting in the poorest health outcomes along, with creating vast health disparities, the Rev. Dr. Gary Gunderson of Atrium Health has said so eloquently, the cutting edge of health ministries is not technical, but relational, how we care for each other. Dr. Gunderson also stresses that technologies of modern medicine are successfully designed to ward off death, but know little about providing the abundant life. Jesus taught and commissioned that abundant life and healing are the work of his disciples! In How God Works: The Science Behind the Benefits of Religion "Scientists and neurologist are reporting that regularly taking part in religious practices lessens anxiety and depression, increases physical health and reduces the risk of early death. These benefits don't come simply from general social contact, but that there is something specific to spiritual practices themselves." For many reasons spiritual communities are THE necessary place where Healing and Wholeness of Body, Mind and Spirit is supported. Watch for information on a new bulletin board under construction in the Narthex and for health tips coming in various forms and communications. We will encourage the participation of all Living Saviour disciples to support one another within the church body and eventually reaching out into the surrounding community in a lifelong journey toward optimal health. Our synod council reviewed the letter and approved a motion from leaders across our synod to engage in this sacred remembrance—and to continue to take steps of lamentation, confession, reconciliation, and healing.

Beginning **Thursday, September 30,** the day when many will wear orange to remember, we too will be wearing orange and draping the synod office chapel with orange fabric.

Will you join us? Join us in draping this fabric, not out of obligation or guilt, but as a sacred remembrance. Make space in your sanctuaries for the memory of children lost far too soon in traumatic and unjust ways. Make space in your sanctuaries for pieces of orange fabric as a commitment to healing with our First Nations siblings.

Orange fabric is only one step in our journey together to honor and heal relationships with our native siblings. Join us in this step. We will continue to share other ways you can grow including making a land acknowledgment, contributing to the AROC Fund of the synod that will support the ongoing work of Living Waters, Cherokee, and lifting up advocacy opportunities in your local community.

Pastor Jack Russell, a survivor of boarding schools himself, powerfully shares his own story and the ways residential schools took the lives of so many children.
