To all the Disciples of Christ who are the Church of Our Living Saviour,

Greetings and Happy New Year to you all! On this first day of the year of our Lord 2023, I pray that the coming year will bring you happiness, good health, prosperity, and all good gifts from God our Father. Last year, 2022, seemed to speed by so fast. One task was barely completed when another one needing attention popped up, culminating in the resignation of Pastor Angela at the start of the Holiday season.

The main reason for this communication (but please read it all) is to inform the congregation of a "Congregation Study" scheduled to take place on Sunday, January 22 immediately after the worship service. Representatives from Bishop Smith's Office will be here to lead this study, which is expected to take approximately 90 minutes to complete. Those present will divide into small groups and provide answers to a few questions posed by the representatives. Bishop Smith indicated the questions are designed to determine what the congregations believes are important aspects for LSLC going forward. He suggested three questions would be similar to the following:

- 1. What are the ministries we don't want to lose?
- 2. What are we not currently doing that God might want us to do?
- 3. We believe that Living Saviour Lutheran Church's next pastor should be someone who

The information gathered during this meeting will be compiled by a small group from the Council and a report will be written and shared with the congregation. This study will form a part of the Ministry Site Profile which will be developed and used by a Call Committee to discern the best candidate to call as the new Pastor of LSLC. Please set aside 90 minutes after worship on January 22 to join your friends at LSLC for this important Congregation Study. Thank you in advance for your willingness to listen, think and share your insights.

Now, I wish to bring you up to date on the progress made in preparation for the call of a new Pastor for Living Saviour Lutheran Church. After saying Farewell and Godspeed to Pastor Angela and Brian, the next necessity was obtaining pastoral coverage for the remainder of December, with the holidays complicating matters. With the dedicated help from the Bishop's Office, we obtained necessary pastoral coverage through January 1, 2023. Please join me in thanking Rev. Linda Hatcher for agreeing to consecrate and serve communion when an ordained pastor is not available, as happened on Christmas Day and New Years Day. (Continued on page 7...)

- ♦ \$250 for Room In The Inn expenses here at Living Saviour in January.



The next goal was to engage an Interim Pastor. It was my great delight to announce one surprise gift to you all during our Christmas Eve services by introducing Rev. Charlie Zimmerman as our Interim Pastor. Pastor Charlie has served as a supply pastor at LSLC in the past. He was well received by you all and came highly recommended by the Bishop's Office. I also was able to announce that Pastor Brook Seaford, also highly recommended by the Bishop's Office, is now engaged as our secondary interim. Engaging two pastors is a new plan for the call process. As a result, an official title for Pastor Brook hasn't been determined. Pastors Charlie and Brook will preach and conduct worship service on alternate Sundays going forward. You will be able to meet Pastor Brook this coming Sunday, January 8. Pastor Charlie will also provide assistance to the Council and me as we navigate the call process and will provide a pastoral presence during our Council meetings. Making this a viable plan is the willingness of Pastor Linda, Don Huff, and Pastor Jay to assist in pastoral care, including visitation, preparing and/or conducting other services such as baptisms, weddings and funeral/memorial services. In addition, our depth in Lay-Care volunteers, Carmel Place leaders, and the Congregation Council will be called upon for home shut-in visitation and communion. This interim period plan was developed with the Bishop's Office in recognition of our record in these areas. I would ask you to include in your prayers all those involved in this plan during the upcoming days.

As I mentioned at the New Year's Day service, a significant message we, as a congregation, can send to potential, available pastoral candidates is about the health of our congregation. Let's face it, a significant aspect of that health is whether we have the funding to allow us to continue our current and future internal and outreach programs as well as the ability to meet the salary requirements of a pastor for LSLC. Our stewardship program was clearly impacted by the resignation of our pastor. We believe we are significantly behind where we should be in returned pledge cards and, therefore, behind in our ability to develop a budget for 2023. So, take this as an urgent request to return your pledge cards by mail, in person, or, if necessary, by email to Barbara Avard as soon as possible. Please return a pledge card even if your offering is by electronic means. An appropriate budget is a critical element examined by possible pastoral call candidates.

As I mentioned on Sunday, please consider satisfying your offering by way of a Qualified Charitable Distribution directly from your IRA to LSLC. If you intend to use your IRA in this manner, you may not be taxed on the value of your offering, which just might allow to increase your offering by your tax savings. As always, please consult your financial specialist before you use this method of making charitable offerings.

And finally, the offering from our Christmas Concert earmarked for Lutheran Services Carolinas and the Bishop's Challenge will be at a minimum \$7,000 and will be used to resettle Ukrainian refugees in our state. Remember Jesus' words — "What you do for the least of these you also do for me." This amount will be noticed and speaks volumes about the generosity and missional orientation of LSLC to potential candidates as well as to the Synod.

May the Love and Peace of God flood your soul during this New Year.
